Student Representation Fees

The Student Representation Fee (SRF) is a voluntary \$2 fee collected by colleges, not to be confused with the student body fee, that is used for advocacy efforts. \$1 is kept by the ASO and \$1 is ultimately given to SSCCC, collected and received twice a year, with funds made available to SSCCC on April 15.




UC's UCSA has ~\$2.81 per student advocate



The Student Senate for California Community Colleges Needs Your Help!

The Student Senate for California Community Colleges (SSCCC) has virtually no presence in the state capital, and little to no ability to lobby on legislation that affects California Community College (CCC) students. The student senate has no staff support which has resulted in increasing difficulties in maintaining a full board. Currently the SSCCC is completely student ran, with little to no professional support. With this demanding workload and inadequate support this often results in members of the board resigning out of frustration. Inadequate funding has resulted in the SSCCC becoming increasingly dependent on the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO). The voice of CCC students should not be held by the CCCCO but by the statewide student organization. Our student leaders need more administrative support both at the state-wide level and at the regional level.

The Student Senate for California Community Colleges is currently funded via the optional \$2SRF. (Student Rep Fee)



In order for the \$2SRF to be implemented on a college campus the student body must hold an election with the average of the last 3 elections participating.




We are unable to have the \$2SRF implemented on campuses as we lack standing to request the item be placed on the school's ballot.



Only 11 of the 114 community colleges have implemented the \$2SRF

The SSCCC is seeking an amendment to education code section 76060.5 so that the California Community College Student Representation Fee is administered in the same way as the CSU System's SRF. The SSCCC would like to see the fee changed so that is implemented at all 115 California Community Colleges as an opt out fee without the need to hold local student body elections.

The SSCCC has already submitted a spot bill and has language ready should you decide to support us in this issue.




Sep. 13 Last day for each house to pass bills (J.R. 61(a)(15)).

- With more than 2.1 million students on 114 campuses, the California Community Colleges is the largest system of higher education in the United States.
- One in every five community college students in the nation attends a California community college.
- Most of the 114 colleges are on the semester system, but Foothill, De Anza and Lake Tahoe community colleges are on the quarter system.
- Three out of every 10 Californians ages 18-24 are currently enrolled in a community college.
- Over 67 percent of California community college students are people of diverse ethnic backgrounds and roughly 53 percent are female.



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
